It's Spring and time to plan your organic veggie garden! On Saturday, March 4th, Sunshine Community Gardens — Austin's urban oasis where organic food and flowers have flourished since 1979 — will host its Annual Plant Sale. Gates open at 9am with a musical parade. Learn from knowledgeable gardeners while you choose from 90 varieties of tomatoes and 54 varieties of peppers. Rounding out the 20,000 plants that will be for sale are varieties of eggplant, herbs, tomatillos, and native flowers. Explore booths of local vendors, walk through our flower gardens, or teach your child to pull a fresh carrot from the ground. Cashiers and Ticket Writers at the Plant Sale

We are in need of volunteers for ticket writers and cashiers at the plant sale. Volunteers can work as little or as much as they like. Cashiers are needed at the following days and times:

Friday evening (March 5th) - 5:00-7:00 Saturday (March 6th) - 8:30-3:30 Sunday morning (March 7th) - TBD

Cashiers typically work a minimum of 2 hour shifts with some staying all day on Saturday, with a break or two. It's a fast paced function that puts

you in touch with all the happy people and their plants.

There is a big need for cashiers processing credit cards. We use the Square app and you would need to download the app on your own device and create an account. From there it's pretty easy. I will schedule a short meeting Friday evening before the sale and will also meet in advance for those that will process credit cards to make sure you are set up and ready to go. We will supply the card reader.

Ticket writers are also needed for Saturday and predominantly in the morning, 8:30 - noon with a couple needed in the afternoon.

Dream to Reality: The Children's Garden

It can often feel slow to bring a dream idea into reality, especially when it is dreamed up by an all-volunteer, non-profit organization. The idea for a Children's Garden came forth over a year ago, and had a committee of enthused and dedicated garden volunteers to create a plan. This past weekend the dream of the Children's Garden at Sunshine got closer to

being realized, as gardeners set in physical motion the final preparations of the Children's Garden.

On Sunday Jimmie Schneider, Jenny Zhang, Victor Houle, Arran Walker, Bill Cason, and Jim Willmann prepared the designated area by covering it in black plastic and landscaper cloth and dug trenches around the perimeter to accommodate cedar boards that will prevent grass intrusion. This week the cedar boards are being installed by Jimmie, Bill, and Jim. Robert Jarry has already constructed the boxes for each garden and they are ready for installation.

What an amazing process to behold the transformation of the ground from bermudagrass land to an inviting area for children. The children's boxes constructed by Robert are just the right size for our newest and youngest gardeners to plant and tend, and we have a list of excited young gardeners ready to be a part of this pilot program. By providing the space and opportunity, Sunshine is instilling the gift of the love of gardening to the youngest members of our community; this gift is likely to last a lifetime.

To help move us even closer to opening the children's plots, on Saturday there is a work day planned by Kerry Howell to install the boxes and cover the area with wood chips. With your volunteer help, the Children's Garden will soon be ready for our youngest gardeners to begin spring planting.

NEW GARDENERS

There are several new gardeners at SCG! Please don't hesitate to introduce yourself and y'all get to know each other a little and share garden knowledge and tips. Let's emphasize the COMMUNITY in Community Garden.

ROADS AND PARKING

- Speed limit is 3 MPH. (Primarily for safety, but also to keep the dust down.)
- Sunshine's roads provide access to plots and common areas.
 Gardeners should not 1) park on roads except to unload a heavy load from vehicle, 2) drive on roads when wet, 3) drive around barriers, 4) drive into another gardener's plot, or 5) put plants or other items in the road.
- Cars may not be left idling while at the garden.
- Park only in the front parking area or your common area. On weekends there are parking spaces on Sunshine and 49th Street.

Handbook and Site rules specifically state that PARKING ON GARDEN

ROADS IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED. Park in the parking lot or common areas only. When the emergency vehicle enters SCG, they may (I hope not) be coming to assist YOU. How inconvenient it would be for them to have to wait for folks to move cars.

PRIORITY TASKS

- Mowing and Trimming everywhere but especially Fenceline and lawn on either side of fence. With the recent rains and more to come, mowing has become a primary task.
- Khaki Weed Season is Upon Us! For the uninitiated, Khaki weed is an invasive plant that infects the garden in late spring, summer, and fall. We are determined every year to eradicate it as much as possible. To this end, we are allowing digging up khaki weed to be counted as TSVBI hours until further notice.
- Maintaining common paths and common areas. If you have plants extending into common paths, trim them. The common paths are designed to allow the biggest wheelbarrows that we own to traverse them unimpeded.

TSVBI

- Weeding paths in TSBVI garden and wood chip areas on west side.
 (This is normally needed. Try to get out roots. Be sure to smooth out paths after weeding to facilitate TSBVI students moving around garden). Mowing between fence and street along 49th St. and Sunshine Dr. along and 10' inside fence.
- Picking up trash wherever you see it.
- Cleaning the street curb gutters of dirt and debris buildup. (At places in the curb gutter along Sunshine Dr. And 49th St. soil has built up and grass is beginning to grow. Scrape off with shovel and put in wheelbarrow. If debris is gravel it can be put in low places in the parking lot, otherwise, destination is dumpster.
- Note: TSVBI hours can also count as regular hours.

REGULAR

- Maintaining common paths. (Gardeners are required to maintain a 2' strip of common paths adjacent to their plot.
- Mowing and cleaning up overgrown/messy places in common areas.
