Locking Up

Recently, the tool shed was left unlocked overnight. All gardeners can help keep Sunshine safe and prevent our tools from disappearing by locking up. If you need to know the combination/codes for the Tool Shed, the Trailer, or the Front Gate please speak to your Zone Coordinator or email Sunshine's President, Iris, at irisslevin861@gmail.com. Different parts of the garden have different locking procedures:

The Power Tool Section of the Tool Shed should *never* be left unlocked and unattended. If you get out a lawn mower or electric weed trimmer please lock the shed as soon as you remove the tool and again when you return the item.

The Tool Shed itself may be left unlocked during daylight hours, but please lock up when sundown approaches or if you are the last person in the garden.

The Trailer may be unlocked from 8am-8pm (or daylight hours during shorter days). Please lock up similarly to the Tool Shed, especially if sundown approaches or you are the last person in the garden in the evening. Please check to make sure no one is in the trailer/restrooms before you lock it. Enter code, then unlatch box at top by sliding latch down. Remove key and unlock the lock. Replace key in lockbox -- you must enter code again to close the lockbox.

The Front Gate should be locked by the last person to leave the garden. Enter the code on the lockbox. Slide the top of the latch down to open the box. Remove the key and unlock the gate. Replace key immediately in the lock box by entering the code again to allow the latch to be closed.

Thank you for doing your part to help keep the tools and garden secure.

Meet New Zone 10 Coordinator Su Vonteri



Now is the time to plant carrots. Backbone Nursery has good planting information. Several things to things to remember:

- 1. Plant 1/4 to 1/2 inch deep. Broadcasting does not work.
- 2. Do not let the seeds dry out. Water the soil several days before planting.
- 3. Water with a fine spray.

to fallow your plot for the rest of the summer, posted below is how to do that (taken from page 28 of the Handbook). Please make sure your Zone Coordinator or Vice President knows you are fallowing your plot.

Fallow Season or Cover Crop

Occasionally, members may choose to leave a plot fallow for a season. This is a good practice to provide the soil a break. Fallow plots should be cleared of plants and weeds, then covered completely with compost and then cardboard, a thick layer of leaves, or other material that allows water to permeate. Avoid using plastic as it creates a good environment for fire ants underneath, and water pools on top. An alternative to a fallow season is to plant a cover crop to serve as green manure; this can be turned under at the end of the season to condition the soil. Consult the literature or local garden center for details on this technique for soil improvement.
